2022 LETTER FROM THE BOARD CHAIR:



As my time serving as the Board Chairman comes to an end and I reflect not only on 2022, but what the Economic Development Alliance has accomplished over the last three years I am incredibly proud. The biggest threats to our community and our membership largely remain the same with attainable housing and recruiting and retaining our workforce being paramount. The Economic Alliance made great strides over the last year in being part of the solution to these issues and are positioned to accelerate that in 2023. Our public-private partnerships are stronger than ever and are aligned on finding solutions to the largest threats to our community.

We have spearheaded programs, grants and funding sources that directly tie to solving some of these issues. I don't believe any organization or municipality can single handedly solve these issues but collectively we can absolutely shape the future of our community. Our "Talent Development Program", in partnership with Fort Lewis College, has been able to connect our brightest students at Fort Lewis with some of our top employers in the area to retain and develop our local workforce. We continue to unite property owners, key stakeholders and municipalities down La Posta Road with a unified vision of how that area can serve the future of our community. These efforts have been supported with funding from our municipalities and input from key property owners.

I have to commend the staff of the Alliance, our elected officials and the staff of the City and County as the foundation of these partnerships are focused around solutions. A great example of this is the Regional Housing Alliance. The RHA has a vital role in improving our attainable and workforce housing challenge and there are natural synergies that exist between the RHA and the Economic Alliance. In 2023 the Economic Alliance will be able to capitalize on the partnerships already established and develop opportunities where the value of the RHA can be fully realized within our community. We are hopeful that this in conjunction with CHFA and Proposition 123 will jump start projects to address the affordable and workforce housing issues.

Lastly, thank you. My six years serving on the Board of the Economic Alliance, and the last three as Chairman, have been more than I hoped for when I initially raised my hand. I've formed wonderful friendships over the last six years, saw our community come together through a pandemic and watched our country and community make great strides in diversity and equality. During that time we had a transition in the Executive Director role, which was not easy and highlighted our housing and workforce recruitment challenges first-hand. Michael French has been an incredible addition to the organization as Executive Director, and his servant leadership style is the lynch pin of the partnerships that the Alliance has helped develop. Our Alliance membership, community and board of directors are incredibly fortunate to have him.

My perpetual "ask" of our Alliance membership, and our community, is to look for opportunities to get involved. Having engaged community members is what shapes the future of our organization and community.



Workforce Development

In 2022, The Alliance received a resiliency grant from La Plata County through Colorado Dept. of Local Affairs and focused on workforce development and equitable housing.

Talent Development Program

The Talent Development Program is an "Intern to Hire" workforce development initiative that was launched and will run through most of 2023. The Alliance was successful in placing thirteen paid positions for FLC seniors or recent graduates with top employers in the county. Of those, five resulted in permanent employment for the interns. Internship compensation for 150 hours is paid for by the Alliance via the grant.



Upskill Reskill - IT Micro Certification Labs

The Alliance partnered with Pueblo Community College and Fort Lewis College to offer an Information Technology micro certification, Network+, to improve career skills and mobility. The FLC's Center for Innovation provided the resources and PCC assisted in registration. The first cohort of fifteen students took place October through December of 2022 and fourteen sat for the final exam in January of 2023. Two more 10-week sessions will take place in the spring and fall of 2023. Tuition and all costs are paid for by the Alliance via the grant.



LA POSTA VISION BECOMES CLEARER IN 2022

La Posta is one of the 'Big Idea' regional projects that can have a transformational impact to both the economics of a light industrial park and addressing the need for housing. After years of ongoing conversations, 2022 was a commitment year that saw the investments from public partners to enable incremental and adaptive development.

The Alliance, in partnership with the city, facilitated the next step of the Sewer Study and contracted the engineering to complete the design and construction cost phase of both water and sewer main infrastructures within the proposed city annexation area. The city and county funded the engineering and design for the road improvements to create construction plans that will determine what infrastructure investments are required. We anticipate annexation process to take place in 2023 which will enable and Urban Renewal Authority to be created to help generate public funding and start to see private developers initiate their projects in phases.



OUR HOUSING CRISIS

The largest issue facing the regional economy is the available workforce. All industries are facing a shortage of workers to address their capacity opportunities including critical essential workers. Teachers, first responders, healthcare and residential services are all having issues being retained and recruited in positions at all levels. The main issue is affordability and more specifically lack of inventory aimed at the workforce. Inventory is required for both rental and home ownership.

The Alliance has made workforce housing a top priority to help enable our businesses to have an available workforce. Housing will ensure that we have a healthy workforce needed to maintain the services we require and the assets we have that create the quality of life and culture of our community.

Alliance 2022 Initiatives to address Housing

Three-Year Housing Investment Plan

The Alliance received a grant in partnership with the City of Durango to create a Three-Year Housing Investment Plan. The investment strategy, authored by two housing consulting firms, prioritizes the key steps necessary to maximize the creation of housing affordable to the local work force. The overarching strategy addresses rental housing, homeownership, a concerted effort to initiate a large-scale housing development, the preservation of existing affordable housing options, and the creation of a local housing fund. Successful execution of the strategy will require coordinated action across jurisdictions and between the public and private sectors.

Catalyst Fund

The Economic Development Alliance has launched a Housing Catalyst Fund to provide more resources to assist workforce housing projects throughout the county. The Catalyst Fund would be directed by a steering committee of representatives from the four governments, any funders and a member of the Alliance board. The fund is positioned to stimulate workforce housing and partner with public entities to help with costs such as needed infrastructure and assist in predevelopment costs like engineering.

Rental Assistance Program

The Alliance created a Rental Assistance program in partnership with First Southwest Bank. The La Plata County Workforce Rental Assistance Program offers low-cost, fixed-rate micro-loans of up to \$5,000 to cover first month's rent, last month's rent and/or a security deposit for eligible La Plata County renters.

Regional Housing Alliance (RHA) contract with Alliance

The RHA signed a professional service contract with Alliance to perform on a multi-initiative scope of work focused on workforce housing in the county. The effort is to align with the Three-Year Housing Investment Strategy. The contract will also seek to assist in positioning workforce housing projects for available state and federal grants.





THE HUMAN SIDE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT NEEDS TO TAKE PRECEDENCE



Our economy in 2022 was healthy but could have been more robust. Some headwinds are variables out of our control, like the airline industry affecting our regional traffic, interest rates influencing borrowing, and inflation impacting the cost of goods. Yet the most prominent issue in our economy is capacity. We do not have the workforce we need to accommodate the potential growth. The inability to recruit and retain the right workforce is directly correlated to the affordability of our community. It is the most significant liability for communities like ours that have reached a crisis level in housing and essential workers' ability to afford to live in the community they serve. This threatens the social fabric of our community as we see the subtle change in demographic based on who can afford to live here while still expecting essential services and amenities that come with a more diverse workforce.

In 2022 we launched several programs from grants focusing on workforce housing, workforce development, and creating the business environment that will keep entrepreneurs and businesses growing here. This is likely the most active the Alliance has ever been in terms of programming, which is all a derivative of public-private partnerships and seeking and finding grant monies. We are a different organization than we were 3 or 4 years ago, and we will continue to think about our role at a strategic level. We must continue addressing the most prominent issues in our community and seek to improve the economic prosperity of our area while preserving our quality of life.

Looking back at 2022, I see it was another challenging year. Everyone was as busy as they could be, making up for lost time and lack of proper human resources. At a macro level, we may be on the doorstep of a recession pushed by inflation numbers we have not seen in a decade or more. We are all trying to figure out the post-pandemic economy globally and regionally. At a local level, we need to ensure the human side of economic development takes precedence. We need people in our community, the workforce, and families that our economy depends on, to make us the vibrant regional financial hub we can be.

When we say "Be part of the conversation," it means to be part of the solution. Be part of how we want to purposely shape how we live, work, learn and play.
